E4C (Edmonton) - Winter clothing and blanket distribution, access to laundry, haircuts and basic toiletries, basic furniture and household items to get you started, (780) 424-7543.

Hope Mission Bargain Shoppe (Edmonton) - Hope provides clients with clothing, blankets and work wear, (780) 485-6888.

Neighborhood Link (Calgary) - NeighbourLink helps more than 10,000 unique clients in Calgary every year. Their needs include furniture, household items, baby supplies, food hampers, bus tickets and more. Our clients are screened financially, according to the "Low Income Cut off" set out by Statistics Canada. Clients come from all walks of life, and are all different types of people: Families, Individuals, Single Parents, New Canadians, Refugees, Disabled Persons, and Senior Citizens. Strathcona County Clothes-Line - County Clothes-Line Resale of donated goods (e.g. clothing, toys, household items, small appliances) at affordable prices to the public. Referred clients shop free. Vouchers are available through Strathcona County Family and Community Ser-



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vices at a maximum of twice per year, (780) 464-7786.

Suit Yourself (Edmonton) - Suit Yourself is an Edmonton-based charitable organization which collects and distributes quality clothing and accessories, free of charge, to low-income women who are seeking employment or making a transition in the workforce. The di (Calgary) - New and used clothing donated by the community at large is provided, free of charge, to anyone who visits the Clothing Centre, located in the Old DI on Fourth Avenue SE. Clients who cannot access The Clothing Centre during daytime hours due to work or school commitments are served through a mobile night service on the residential floors. Any client in need of emergency clothing or footwear can access this by request to the 2nd Floor Day Office from 7:00am-9:00pm or through their residential floors nightly between 9:00pm-7:00am. The Clothing Centre also provides home packages of bedding, towels, dishes and blankets to low income Calgarians and clients moving out of the DI or other shelters. (403) 263-5707

211 Alberta - (Resource Information) 211 was launched in Edmonton in 2004 and in Calgary in 2005. United Way has been instrumental in bringing 211 to cities in Alberta, and it is now playing a leading role, along with many community partners, to initiate and implement a province-wide service so more people can benefit from the 24 hour support. The 211 service is an enhancement, not a replacement, of local Information & Referral services currently operating across the province. Sensory friendly shopping hours being rolled out at Edmonton grocery stores! A spokesperson for the company said these changes will include reducing 50 per cent of the lighting in stores and silencing or limiting triggering noises like PA systems and scanners. Grocery carts will not be collected during these special hours, since that activity can produce loud noises. The stores will have these sensory friendly hours on Mondays from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. The specialized shopping experience includes dimming store lights, and turning off music, PA announcements, and cash register sounds. More than 450 grocery stores across Canada have implemented specific, sensory-friendly shopping hours in order to make the grocery shopping experience more accessible. Empire's family of brands, which includes Sobeys, Safeway, IGA, Thrifty Foods, Foodland and FreshCo stores, they are the first group of stores to offer this shopping experience.

4th Annual Sound Off

The 4th Annual Sound Off: A Deaf Theatre Festival is happening this month in conjunction with the Chinook Series. The festival runs February 12- 16th and is hosting ASL and English Accessible performances and workshops. All performances are at the ATB Arts Barns and are barrier-free (wheelchair spaces are limited so it is suggested you call ahead to book those seats- 780-409-1910). In addition to the performances, ASL Interpreters will be stationed throughout the space and access to hearing loops are provided. The shows at this year's festival include Deaf Cabaret, 100 Decibels' Deaflix and Chill, The Two Natashas: Our life in Guyana, Deafies' Detective Agency and the THEATRESPORTS: Sound Off Edition. Workshops will be held in the early part of the days including: adding subtitles to your performances, and incorporating meaningful sign language into per-
